Growing Clubs Committee

Thirteen Club Contacts were approached, recently, by committee members to participate in a survey. Thanks to the Club Contacts who provided the Committee with valuable information! Tom Kahnert reported the results of the survey to the executive. We learned that all participating clubs want to attract new dancers and, the overwhelming majority, want help from the Growing Clubs Committee to do so.

There is a projected 25% decline in club membership, post-covid, so it will be more important than ever to engage new dancers. The Committee will send a member to interested clubs to assess their needs and to share tips about strategies that have worked with other clubs. The Committee can also provide access to professional graphic design and printing for flyers and business cards. Take advantage of these valuable resources and get your club growing in the 2022-2023 dance season.

Remember When...

Looking Back 2021-11 by Dorothy Dahm, SWOSDA Historian

Last month I started out on a rainy day. This time it is more definitely a wintry scene – a good day to stay indoors.

1971-12 Bugle

- In the Presidents' message, John and Peggy Wilson reminded the readers that it is our job to make sure that members are made aware of proposals being put forward by their executive committees and with serious thought and discussion make their delegates aware of how they should vote on these issues at the annual meeting. They also suggest that time has a habit of going by so quickly that now is the time to give consideration in the club to nominations for SWOSDA executive. They even suggested that each club should submit at least one nomination. *Wouldn't that be quite the change?* It would result in the need for an election to choose the actual needed executive members?

There was lots of banner-stealing going on. In one case where there was no banner available to steal, they stole the caller's shirt. At another club they had to dance one tip "no hands" in order to get their banner back. Another club had to dance the tip with shoe boxes on their feet.

1981-12 Bugle

I am including on a separate page a Christmas message included in both 1871 and 1981 Bugles. Simcoe Star-A-Naders shared two Punch recipes which had been taken from the Cookbook available at the Detroit convention. I am copying them here in case you might be of use to you sometime when entertaining groups has been approved.

Jingle Bell Punch – 1 quart cranberry juice, ½ cup maraschino cherry juice, 1 can 16 oz frozen lemonade concentrate, 2 litres of a lime-lemon carbonate beverage. Combine first three ingredients. At serving time, pour over ice in the punch bowl and add the carbonated beverages. Serves about 40.

Party Pink Pineapple Punch – Combine one 46 oz can Dole Pineapple Juice unsweetened, ½ cup Realemon, 1/2 c. water, 1 cup sugar, and 1-quart Cranberry Juice. Stir well. Add 3 large bottles (1pt., 8 oz) Vernor's Ginger Ale at last minute for lively bubbles. Add frozen ice ring. Makes 8 quarts punch.

Frozen Ice Ring – Add 1 pkg. Cherry Kool-Aid (unsweetened to 4 cups water). Stir well. Pour into large jello mold. Place in freezer

1991-11 Bugle

As of 11 Oct 1991, 1125 dancers were registered for Convention 92 in Winnipeg.

The Recipe Corner

Chocolate Biscotti

1 cup sugar
1 cup canola oil
4 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
4 cups flour
2 tsp. baking powder
½ tsp. salt
1 ½ cups semi sweet chocolate chips



1. Preheat oven to 350 and line cookie sheet with parchment paper.
2. In large bowl, beat sugar, oil, eggs and vanilla. Gradually add the dry ingredients to this mixture. Add chocolate chips and mix until combined.
3. Half the dough and shape into logs approximately 14x2 on the parchment paper.
4. Bake for 30 minutes and cool for 10.
5. Reduce oven to 300.
6. Slice each log on the diagonal into ¼ inch slices and bake for 30 minutes, turning over after 15. Cool.
7. Drizzle or dip the biscotti into melted semi sweet chocolate chips or chunks. You will need around 2 cups of chips.
8. Don't eat too many at a time!

Of homemade Christmas fudge.

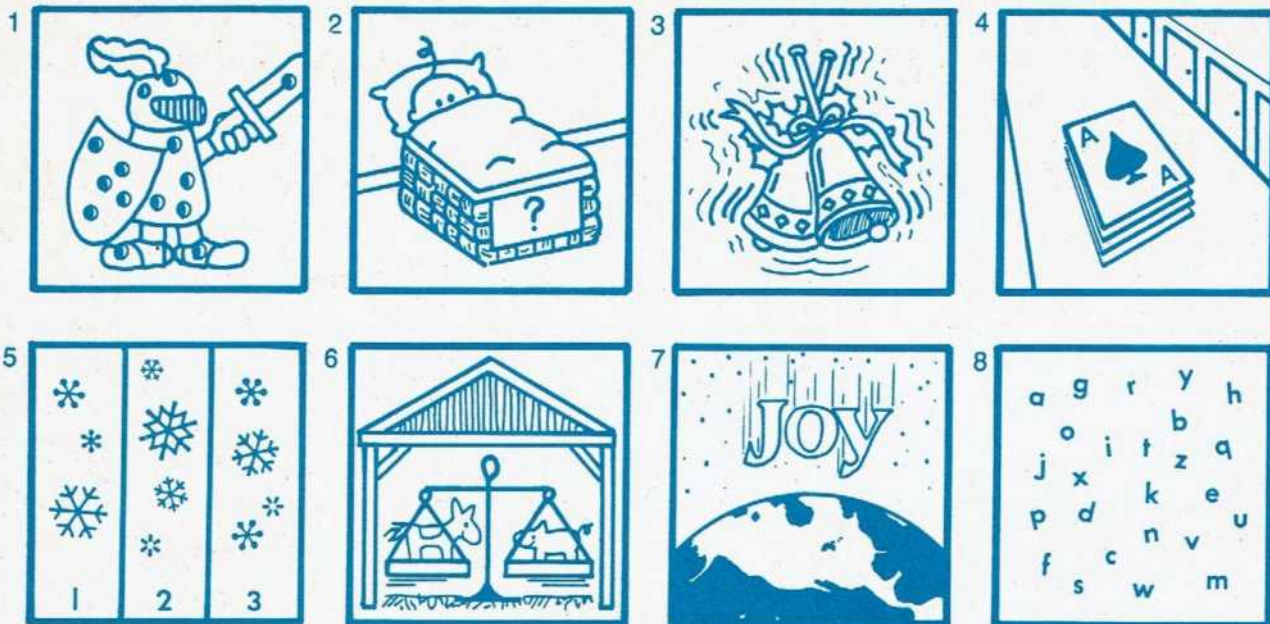

You must have received your second dose fourteen days prior to the day you enter the Convention. Proof of vaccination will be verified upon entry.
